
OCTOBER CHRISTIAN EDUCATION SERIES STARTS WEDNESDAYS, OCT. 9



From Fr. Gary's Sermon last Sunday:

"VIM is an acronym coined by the influential Christian philosopher and theologian Dallas Willard. VIM captures the essential aspects of spiritual formation and personal growth.

Vision: Vision refers to our perspective, ideas, and worldview. It is about understanding the bigger picture—the overarching purpose and direction of our lives.

Intention: Intention speaks to our commitment and agency. It is about making deliberate choices aligned with our vision. Many Christians attend church, engage in Bible studies, and

participate in ministry activities. While these are good, they can only impact us to a certain extent. True transformation requires more - a direct engagement with the Holy Spirit that goes beyond mere willpower.

Means: Means are the practical pathways through which transformation occurs. They are the intentional practices and disciplines that open us up to God's work in our hearts and minds. These means include prayer, scripture reading, worship, solitude, community, and other spiritual practices. When we actively participate in these means, we position ourselves for growth and inner change."

Sunday, September 1

Psalm 150 Praise God in his sanctuary; praise him in his mighty heavens. Praise him for his acts of power, praise him for his surpassing greatness. Let everything that has breath praise the LORD. (vv.1b-2, 6a NIV)

The introduction to this psalm tells us to praise God everywhere in every way and suggests trumpet, harp, lyre, tambourine, dancing, strings, flute, cymbals: clashing and resounding. This word of encouragement goes straight to my heart of thanksgiving after being isolated with sudden back pain after a week of joy caring for our 4-month-old granddaughter and arriving home to celebrate a public achievement award my son had helped earn.

When I awoke to pain that required God's help to get out of bed, I prayed, "Help me, Jesus." Then I reminded myself out loud, "The LORD is my Shepherd, I shall not be in want" through the final verse, "Surely goodness and love will follow me all the days of my life and I will dwell in the house of the LORD forever." (Psalm 23:1, 6). After asking our parish intercessors to pray, reaching out to my doctor, and shooting up a prayer of provision upon my nurse/husband, I sat weeping in thanksgiving that God was leading the attack against my enemies of fear, pain, and confusion.

No available trumpet nor harp nor ability to dance but, in God's presence, I had no fear; just peace and His wisdom to rest and receive from others. And, I continue to praise God from whom all blessings flow and thank Jesus for being with me on our journey out of all valleys.

Job 11:1-9, 13-20; Psalms 148, 149; Revelation 5:1-14; Matthew 5:1-12

Monday, September 2

Acts 11:19-30 The Lord's hand was with them, and a great number of people believed and turned to the Lord. When he arrived and saw the evidence of the grace of God, he was glad and encouraged them all to remain true to the Lord with all their hearts. He was a good man, full of the Holy Spirit and faith, and a great number of people were brought to the Lord. (vv.21, 23-24)

As the good news about the Lord Jesus spread from Jews to Greeks, the church in Jerusalem sends Barnabas, one of the seventy whom Jesus Christ sent out in pairs "like lambs among wolves" (Luke 10:3) to Antioch. Barnabas sees the evidence of God's grace—many accepting Christ as their Savior—and rejoices. Then he continually encourages them to persevere in prayer and to obey the Lord with all their hearts. It was here in Antioch that all Christ followers were first called Christians.

Barnabas, "Son of Encouragement," had no formula. He knew the power of a clinging love relationship with the Christ who loves us and gave himself up for us. Barnabas' depended upon Jesus Christ as Savior and Redeemer. "To you, O Lord, I lift up my soul; in you I trust, O my God" (Psalm 25:1).

Sounds like being a Barnabas to others is what Christians do. "Help me, Jesus, love others with the love you have shared with me" is my first thought. How about you?

Job 12:1-6, 13-25; Psalm 25; John 8:21-32

Tuesday, September 3

Acts 12:1-17 He had James, the brother of John, put to death with the sword. So Peter was kept in prison, but the church was earnestly praying to God for him. Then Peter came to himself and said, "Now I know without a doubt that the Lord sent his angel and rescued me from Herod's clutches..." (vv.2, 5, 11)

Here we see two ways God's sovereignty can be expressed: physical rescue or no physical rescue. Peter is released from prison and certain death while the church is urgently pleading to God. James is not rescued and dies professing his faith in Jesus Christ. Both James and Peter remained faithful and obedient to God.

We believe that God *is* sovereign, omniscient, omnipotent, omnipresent; that God uses our plans to fulfill his purposes and that God's will shall be done on earth as it is in heaven. So, our response is to continue praying earnestly, remaining faithful and obedient to God, regardless of the outcome.

To me, it is surrendering the issue into the hands of the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God through the fellowship of the Holy Spirit, and not altering course. Recalling the miraculous birth of my grandson, who struggled for 6 minutes before delivery, I prayed with passion in distress, aware of possible outcomes, and entrusted every facet of his healing into the hands of Jesus Christ, my Lord, my Savior, and my Redeemer. "Hear my cry for mercy as I call for help, as I lift up my hands toward your Most Holy Place" (Psalm 28:2).

Job 12:1, 13:3-17, 21-27; Psalm 26; John 8:33-47

Wednesday, September 4

Acts 12:18-25 They shouted, "This is the voice of a god, not of a man." Immediately, because Herod did not give praise to God, an angel of the Lord struck him down, and he was eaten by worms and died. But the word of God continued to increase and spread. (vv.22-24)

Herod dies because of his pride and self-serving behavior, misunderstanding the crowd's assertion, and neither rebuking them nor rejecting their flattery. We see God's response to the sin of blasphemy. Herod was no longer able to suppress the spread of the Good News of the gospel.

The common thread of these disciples was Christ and God's word continued to increase and spread. Paul's perspective: "I planted the seed, Apollo's watered it, but God made it grow" (1 Corinthians 3:6-7). Look around you, your family, your friends, your church, your community... What are you doing to show others the grace of God in Jesus Christ—his love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness. Be bold and act with me, I pray. We do our best; God does the rest.

Job 12:1, 14:1-22; Psalm 38; John 8:47-59

Thursday, September 5

Acts 13:1-12 "Will you never stop perverting the right ways of the Lord? Now the hand of the Lord is against you. You are going to be blind, and for a time you will be unable to see the light of the sun." Immediately mist and darkness came over him, and he groped about, seeking someone to lead him by the hand. When the proconsul saw what had happened, he believed, for he was amazed at the teaching about the Lord. (vv.10c-12)

Paul was filed with the Holy Spirit when he discerned that Elymas the sorcerer (that is what his name means) was a child of the devil, an enemy of all that is right, and full of deceit and trickery. Then Paul spoke a direct and specific word of judgment from God causing Elymas'

blindness. That event opened the proconsul's eyes to see and his heart to believe the teaching of Jesus Christ, because he was amazed at God's word in action.

Deeds and words coming together are essential for us to believe in our hearts. Every word in the Bible is truth for us. Yet, the word needs to be acted upon for belief, right? Recalling the anger that became a bitter root of unforgiveness in me years ago, it was difficult to let it go, as it impacted my family's life. I "worded" myself without relief until I finally opened the door of my heart to Jesus for help in action.

Sitting in a Bible study one day, I was overwhelmed with all the ways others were experiencing the presence and action of God in and around them. That's what I wanted. So, I asked. "I will put my laws in their minds and write them on their hearts" (Hebrews 8:10a). God's grace in Christ Jesus wrote his law on my heart and forgiveness and blessing followed.

Job 16:16-22, 17:1, 13-16; Psalm 37:1-18; John 9:1-17

Friday, September 6

John 9:18-41 "He is a prophet. Whether he is a sinner or not, I don't know. One thing I do know. I was blind but now I see. If this man were not from God, he could do nothing." Jesus heard that they had thrown him out, and when he found him, he said, "Do you believe in the Son of Man?" "Who is he, sir?" the man asked. "Tell me so that I may believe in him." Jesus said, "You have now seen him; in fact, he is the one speaking with you." Then, the man said, "Lord, I believe," and he worshipped him. (vv.17b, 25, 33, 35-38)

On the road Jesus sees a blind man from birth as disciples wonder who sinned. Jesus proceeds to put mud with saliva on the blind man's eyes and instructs him to wash in the pool of Siloam; the man washes and sees for the first time. The Pharisees' attention is alerted; they proceed to interrogate the man several times and his parents. But the man who can now see will not be diverted from telling his story and the pharisees still don't see that this man who healed the blind man has to be from God.

The blind man could see that the presence of his Lord and his Messiah brings healing in spirit, soul, and body. He worshipped him. He tells a bit of my story, too. Years ago, I was blind and called out to Jesus in desperation; he was my provider and he wasn't providing. He came to me in a ball of fire in my backyard. I knew I wasn't alone; I worshipped.

"Be merciful to me, O Lord, for I am in distress; my eyes grow weak with sorrow, my soul and my body with grief" (Psalm 31:10). "But grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. To him be glory boy now and forever! Amen" (2 Peter 3:18).

Job 19:1-7, 14-27; Psalm 31; Acts 13:13-25

Saturday, September 7

John 10:1-18 "Very truly, I am the gate for the sheep. I am the gate, whoever enters through me will be saved. I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. I am the good shepherd; I know my sheep and my sheep know me-just as the Father knows me and I know the Father—and I lay down my life for the sheep. The reason my Father loves me is that I lay down my life-only to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord." (vv.7, 9, 11, 14-18)

"I am" is repeated 3 times; "the good shepherd" is repeated 3 times; "I know, my sheep know, the Father knows, I know the Father" is repeated 4 times; and "lays down his life, lays down my life, lays it down" for the sheep is repeated 4 times. Here is a picture of God's grace in Jesus

Christ in word and in deed: the intimate relationship between Father and Son, Jesus' love and obedience to his Father, Jesus' love for us that assures our protection with his own life.

Each of us has a window into the presence and power of a loving God who promises to always be with us and for us in new life In Christ every day: abundant life received, not because we deserve it or earned it, but because of our Good, Good Shepherd.

Let's celebrate God's deliverance from our sins, pride, suffering, confusion, and.... "I will exalt you, O Lord, for you lifted me out of the depths and did no let my enemies gloat over me. O Lord my God, I called to you for help and you healed me" (Psalm 30:1-2).
